While revealing the officer who interviewed Miss Grinham did have training to deal with rape inquiries, the report states the officer in charge of the investigation had "no specialist training regarding the investigation of sexual offences."
The publication of the report comes as national watchdogs this week criticised police in England and Wales for failing to spot

and Wales for failing to spot links between sex attacks and for not identifying rapists early enough.

The Inspectorate of Constabularies and the Crown Prosecution Service inspectorate or theirsed the number of allegations of rape closed as a 'no crime' in some forces, in a joint report. Miss Grinham said: "I

SUFFOLK police today said a new team has been created to help support those reporting rape allegations.

Det Ch Supt Andy Henwood said recromenda-tions made by the profes-sional standard's depart ment have assisted with the new structure for rape investigations.

"Suffolk Constabulary "Suffolk Constabiliary has created a countywide Gemini Team with special ist rape-trained officers who work with the victim who work with the victual from the outset to ensure they receive the best possi-ble support, advice and guidance. They follow national protocol and best practice compiled from forces throughout the country," he said. "This matter has been referred to the IPCC and as such we can not comment on this any further.


Investigation continues after body found
