



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# Vandals smash grave of stillborn baby

A MOTHER has spoken of her distress after vandals destroyed the grave of her baby son.

Sharon Hawkey, from Creek Country, Darlington, contacted those responsible for cleaning the Graveside of her son, Warren Moore, who was stillborn in April 2000.

Sharon, whose secretary, Helen Fawcett, 35, who chose to remain anonymous, said: "I don't understand why someone would do something like that."

"It's so wrong that someone could have destroyed the grave because it had been laid in place by a stone mason," she said.

The stone masons approached the police and discovered that out of the £1,000 that Sharon had given to have her son buried, nothing had been spent.

"I don't understand how someone could do that to any grave, especially that of a baby," she said. "They must be sick or have something wrong with them."

Police are appealing for information about the incident, and urged anyone with information to contact PC Geoff

to 110, or PC Sally Chapman at Creek Country Station on 1155-5814, or Crimestoppers on 0800-555-111.

In a separate incident, members of Newcastle Unitarians' youth committee's environmental group were prevented from taking a service at Bishop Auckland's town cemetery.

The Rev. Mark Constance, vicar of Newcastle Unitarians, said: "We were taken from the grave of a 14-year-old boy, who died last year. The attack happened sometime between 10pm on Wednesday, November 9, and 9am on Saturday.

A spokesman for Durham Police said: "This is the second time in recent weeks that such a crime has occurred, and the nature of the theft is distressing for the family. The cemetery is regularly patrolled by the police, but we expect it is a well-known area for youths to congregate." # Fingerprint device makes impression

A GADGET which can check fingerprints is already helping police out on the beat catch criminals in East Durham.

Durham Constabulary is one of the country's forces taking part in the Lantern project.

The hand-held mobile devices enable officers to check someone's identity on the scene, scrapping any need to return to a police station.

They work by scanning in the index finger's print, with the image then sent to a national database using a WiFi connection.

A response is given within two minutes and if a match is found it gives details including criminal record, date of birth and an indication of the level

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of confidence in the result, ranging from high to low.

Results have already been seen in the south of the county, helping to put one East Durham youth before a court.

The 17-year-old, who lives in the travelling community in Peterlee, was charged with robbery after an incident in Staindrop in the early hours of June 1, when a 19-year-old was punched, kicked and had £50 stolen as he made his way home.

He has already made his first appearance before magistrates.

The project is being co-ordinated by the National Policing Improvement Agency and has trained 50 road policing

and core officers from the south of the county to use the Sagem terminals.

Inspector Andy Huddleston, who heads the south area road policing unit, said: "The idea for this system came through the development of Automatic Number Plate Recognition.

"A large number of drivers stopped through ANPR give false details and Lantern provides a fast and efficient way of checking them out."

"They are available '24/7' and can be used in a variety of situations."

Other results include the identification of a man found unconscious by the roadside in Darlington, with officers able to discover who he was within 20 minutes, and correct details of a man being highlighted after he gave false information.

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# Youngsters keep elderly relatives safe from crime

Youngsters are helping their relatives prevent them from becoming victims of bogus callers as part of a national campaign known as 'Keep Your Elders Safe'.


Thousands of calls from con artists, scammers and other criminals are received by seniors every day, according to the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children. Some 80 percent of the calls are from people the same family taking to each other — or from someone they have no relationship to at all.

They were funded by CP Electric UK, Northern Gas Utilities and Northeastern Water.

The scheme was launched yesterday at the Hatch Centre in Sunderland, under the umbrella of Strongbow, the regional operation to beat crime managed by Durham City Council and Northumbria Police Force and Northern Water.

It will be carried out through local schools, colleges, youth groups and other organisations.

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# Ex-Policemen who never walked sold guns spared jail

TWO former police officers who set themselves up as "gun dealers" were spared jail by a judge who criticized the "farce" licensing system of local forces. Maurice Alan, 45, and Lucien Dubois, 46, were given suspended sentences by a judge at Newcastle Crown Court after they admitted misconduct in public office.

The judge was told how the pair were former firearms officers with Durham Police, although both have now resigned. Working separately, they would sell guns purchased by members of the public to commercial arms institutions without permission. Maurice Elcock, representing the two men, said he had been told all guns purchased from trading firms, licensed or not, could be sold on by them.

Mr Elcock said the pair would have, with their firms, contracts to supply arms to local shooting clubs, most of which had been sold on due to his discovery.

Alan was suspended between 1983 and 1985, and between 1986 and 1988, for similar illegal acts. The first time he was suspended he was accused of accepting £1,000 from a gun dealer to let him sell his surplus weapons to the dealer.
