Four held over police corruption

Four police officers have been arrested on suspicion of corruption, according to Scotland Yard.

One woman and three men are being held after two separate investigations following tip-offs from colleagues.

Three are attached to CID units in Tower Hamlets, east London, and the fourth was working away from the units.

The allegations range from a "corrupt relationship" with a suspected criminal, to misconduct and conspiracy to pervert the course of justice.

A 44-year-old man from Dagenham, east London, has also been arrested.

Lawrence case 'corruption' probe

An investigation is being launched over claims that police corruption helped shield the killers of black teenager Stephen Lawrence from conviction.

A BBC investigation alleges that the murder inquiry's Det Sgt John Davidson was paid by drug smuggler Clifford Norris, father of suspect David Norris.

Criminal Offence

**Misconduct in Public Office – Indictable only,
maximum sentence of life imprisonment**

- Misfeasance – doing a legal act for an improper reason (e.g. check friends on police computer)

- Malfeasance – person in a public office doing an illegal act (e.g. sell intelligence to criminals, sexually abuse vulnerable victims)

- **Favours – free Meals, cheap goods, lending money, etc**
- **Sex – entrapment & abuse of position**

Corruptors will seek:

- Information
- Obstruction of Justice

The Corrupted will be motivated by:

- Material gain
- Family/social pressures

MAIN AREAS THAT CAN CAUSE YOU PROBLEMS:

■ Inappropriate Associations

- You can choose your friends – not your family
- You must manage your associations
- Associations that make you vulnerable:
 - Active criminals
 - Sex workers
 - Private investigators
 - Journalists
 - Gyms – steroid users

■ Social Networking

- Facebook, Bebo, Friends Reunited
- Social Networking.ppt

MAIN AREAS THAT CAN CAUSE YOU PROBLEMS

■ Drugs

- It is illegal – you are part of the police service
- It makes you vulnerable to corruption and compromise

■ Financial Difficulties

- Criminals have cash, may seem legitimate and will want to "help"

■ Disclosure of Information

- Family, friends, intimate relationships

Police chief criticises 'leak' Pc

Derbyshire Police's Assistant Chief Constable said she was "incredibly disappointed" one of her staff leaked details in a case where a man died.

Bernard Gilbert, 79, died minutes after a brick was thrown into his home.



The brick went through a bedroom window in the bungalow

Pc Steven Smith illegally passed on Mr Gilbert's address to the men who planned and carried out the attack.

Mark Forbes, 40, of Kedleston Close, Ripley, and younger brother Steven, 22, of Gladstone Street, South Normanton, were found guilty of manslaughter.

Pc Smith found the address by looking up Mr Gilbert's registration number on the Police National Computer.

He was fined £1,200 under the Data Protection Act and resigned from the force.

MAIN AREAS THAT CAN CAUSE YOU PROBLEMS

Computer Misuse

- Offensive emails
- Inappropriate internet use
- Can browse the Internet for personal use before and after a shift and during a designated rest/lunch break, up to a maximum of 30 minutes per day.
- 10 personal email messages during any working day.
- Managers discretion
- Personal use of social networking sites at work (Facebook, MySpace etc) is prohibited for security reasons.
- Access to any Webmail (googlemail, hotmail, Yahoo, AOL, etc) is prohibited due to the serious security implications.
- Close the browser don't minimise it – impacts on performance and presents a significant security risk

Work Carried out

- **Intelligence led Criminal Investigations**
into police employee's (PACE, RIPA, etc all apply)
- **Intelligence Led Integrity Testing**
No random integrity tests in A & S; different to "Mystery shopper"
- **Monitor & Trace Use of Internal Telephone System**

Work Carried Out (cont)

- **Drug Tests:** Can test police officers with cause and all police officers in certain posts at random
- **Audit the Force Computer Systems, PNC, Guardian, Outlook, Internet, Assist**
criminal offence - Computer Misuse Act, Data Protection Act, Rehabilitation of Offenders Act, Malicious Communications Act
- **Reduce opportunities for Corruption:**
Policy & Procedures; vulnerable computer systems; vetting

We Don't Do

- Unsatisfactory Performance Issues
- Bullying and Fairness at Work (but we do take anonymous referrals on the confidential hotline)
- Public Complaints.

HOW MANY REFERRALS?

1999 – 49 investigations

2007 – 100 investigations (240 intel reports)

2010 – 122 investigations (350 intel reports)

Examples of cases

- Unlawful Sexual Intercourse
- Theft/Obtain Property by Deception
- Information disclosure to criminals
- Racist language/behaviour
- Child abuse images
- Drug use (heroin, cocaine, cannabis)
- Misconduct in Public Office
