The Firm draws stenden to this evidence because it indicates that there has been some combaton in the mind of Mr. Rupert Murdock, or perhaps that he has been minimistrated, about the role of the Firm. As stated above, his account of the inspections to the Firm were that it had been estated "to find out what the kell was going on wal. It is quite elear that that it not what the First was intrinced to do. But the cridence above suggests that Mr. Rupert Murdoch may in fact have been thinking of the instructions given to Burton Copeland.   19 It has been suggested that if the Firm had found evidence, in the course of its retained by News international, of criminal offeres having been committed by News international executives, then the Firm would have been entitled (or even obliged) to report its findings directly to the police.
