





















For Distribution to CPs

The opportunity to apply for the Commissioners post closes (closed) @ 12 noon today. Though both proud of and grateful for the enormous support and encouragement I have received, I will not be (I have not) putting my (put) my name forward for the position. Though I consider it to be the most exciting and challenging job in world policing. I do not believe my candidacy @ this time is in the best interests of the people we serve or the organisation I currently lead. Whilst the Met will always be @ the centre of difficult and high profile issues, our recent past has seen too much turbulence associated with as much who we are as opposed to the job we do. Particularly damaging have been the allegations over recent years of political partiality. The correctness or otherwise of our operational activity to investigate potential criminal offences associated with a series of leaks of goyt papers will be judged in due course. That is right. However, suggestions in recent days that I or any of the senior officers under my command have, or would allow our operational judgement to be improperly influenced by politics or politicians, either to do or not do something, is deeply disturbing and professionally offensive. I cannot run the risk of any continuing perceptions of this nature, however speculative and incorrect they may be. The Met must move on from this. To this end I believe it to be in the interests of my organisation and the communities we serve for there to be a clear change of leadership. Accordingly I will be retiring from the service in April next year following the appointment of a new Commissioner. This will provide the opportunity for the appointment of people to the two most senior positions in the Met who are confident they can work with this MPA leadership, unencumbered by the past.
