Thank you for your letter dated 27 March 2007 concerning proposed changes to the Editor's Code of Practice.

I note that the Committee will not be using the wording that I first suggested at our meeting in October 2006. However, as you are aware, I am not committed to any particular wording. I recognise that the proposed changes to Clause 10 are intended to address the issues which we have raised at the self-regulatory level. I hope that they will be introduced with maximum publicity and advice to the media. Otherwise, the 'burial' of the changes within the existing Code, and the absence of a section explicitly prohibiting the obtaining of any private information without consent or a public interest justification, may present the risk that unacceptable activity will continue.

You should be aware that I am still committed to the introduction of stronger penalties to address the illegal trade in personal information. It remains to be seen how effective the proposed changes will be in practice and the proposed increase in the maximum sentence is aimed not just at the press but at the wider problem. It is essential that there should be an effective deterrent across the board.

Finally, I should add that my staff are currently working with the industry on the production of section 55 guidance for journalists and I would expect it to be incorporated into the Editor's Codebook at the relevant section to supplement your changes to the Code and clarify the application of the Data Protection Act 1998.
